	Whole Class Reading
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This term your child will be reading *Charlotte's Web* which will support the learning the children will be completing in English. The text will be used to develop the children's vocabulary; abilities to infer, predict and explain; and the skills of sequencing and summarising a text.

As well, this will be an opportunity for the children to develop their confident reading voices. We are hoping to develop their ability to express and use intonation appropriately.

**Reading** Please support by correcting spellings while your child is doing their Home Learning. At Floreat, we are direct when giving feedback e.g. a child spells the word 'accident' with an a > accidAnt, we say "In this word the sound is represented with an `e'."

Read with your child as often as possible! And, crucially, *re-read* with them. If your child has read a text out loud to you, ask them to re-read it once they have gone through the decoding stage. This will help comprehension. Finally, read it *to* them. This models intonation and expression when they re-read it for a final time.

Ask your child to summarise what they are reading. Challenge them to create summaries of a section of text with fewer than ten words.

MathsDuring this half term, children will start by learning about multiplication and division and the correct<br/>related mathematical language for these operations. They will explore the relationship between<br/>multiplication and division whilst building on their knowledge of arrays. Then, the children will begin to<br/>link related number facts. The children will formally learn about the 'Distributive law' and use their<br/>knowledge of it to apply to addition and subtraction questions. Children will be developing their skills on<br/>the multiplication table facts. In all Maths lessons the children will be working on their investigative skills,<br/>fluency as well as mathematical reasoning.Please support your child to recall their multiplication table facts rapidly and out of sequence.<br/>Times Table Rock Stars is a fantastic resource to support with this. Knowledge	<ul> <li>Science – We will be learning about the classification of plants and animals. We will look closely at the concept of classification in relation to vertebrates, invertebrates and plants. Children will learn about Carl Linnaeus and his work to name and classify living things</li> <li>History – This half term, your child will continue learning about the Anglo-Saxons and the Vikings</li> <li>Geography – This half term, your child will be learning about Mediterranean Europe. They will be locating this on a map, as well as comparing two geographical locations with respect to their climate, culture and geographical features.</li> <li>You can support your child at home by questioning them about the areas we are studying this half-term and encouraging them to read widely around them too. Any additional knowledge that your child brings to the classroom will be duly celebrated!</li> </ul>
Character and PSHE (Jigsaw)	Your child is learning about empathy and perspective, humour and fairness. Whilst looking at these virtues we will explore real life contexts that the children might find themselves in and how we could approach these situations. These virtues will be embedded through discussion and stories as well as activities rooted in reality that will bring the learning to life! We will also be learning about the life of Carter G. Woodson, a historian, thinking about his perspective of what life might have been like in his time, as well as comedian Lenny Henry, and the impact he has made in his field. In PSHE this term, we will be looking at "Being Me In My World". Within this topic, we will look at: learning about being part of a class team; being a school citizen; rights, responsibilities and democracy; rewards and consequences; group decision-making; having a voice; and what motivates behaviour. In terms of developing your child's character, really question them. For example, this half-term, challenge your child's judgements – make them reason as to why they make the judgements they do and help to illuminate different perspectives.
Music	This term we will be introducing 'Composer of the Week'. The children will listen to a different composer every week and we will discuss and compare the different musical variations. In addition, we will also continue to learn and sing a variety of songs. You can support your children by exposing them to a variety of classical composers and discussing the music.
P.E. and Dance	This half term Year 4 children will be developing their skills in hockey. This will include co-ordination skills, team work and fundamental movement skills. Please ensure your child comes into school wearing their full P.E. kit on their PE day. Children will not be getting changed at school until further notice.
